As we head into fall, our 2019 Bluegill Tournament still has a distinct Delaware flavor, with each of our top three entries thus far have still originated in a Delaware pond. Frank Bowne submitted our first entry of the year and he continues to hold the lead with his impressive 9-inch fish that he caught at Blairs Pond on April 9th. Frank used a blue topwater fly to entice the below monster bluegill:



A possible first place tying bluegill was caught recently by Mike Mattia. His entry of 9 inches was caught on October 6 on Concord Pond. Mike used a red and white "flip flop" popper to hook and land this latest entry pictured below.



In third place is John Rentch with a nice 8.25-inch bluegill. John pulled his entry from Ingrams Pond, also located in Delaware, on May 7th. A yellow bass popper encouraged his entry to bite.

Clearly, its going to take a 10" whopper of a bluegill to knock Frank and Mike out of first place...the good news is there is still time! Our contest is still open for entries. Remember to submit your entries to me, Mark Bange, mbange54@gmail.com along with the date you caught the fish, the location and a description of the fly you used. When possible, show the fly in the photo.


The photo, of course, is key to your entry. It must show the whole fish clearly and it must measure its length against a ruler. Also, please make sure your entry was caught by a fly. There are imitation worm flies and there are real worms. An earthworm is irresistible to bluegills but it is not a fly and therefore not a suitable bait for our contest. I had to disallow an otherwise top three entry that was caught by a worm, not a worm fly.

The prize will be the winning member's name on clubhouse plaque (with room for winners in years to follow) and a small trophy that member keeps. The prize and the trophy will be awarded to the winning member at the club's annual Holiday Party on December 4th.

Featured Fly Murdich Minnow

One my favorite patterns this year and recent subject for fly tying class recently. The Murdich's Minnow originally a Striped Bass pattern can also be utilized for trout fishing, as well as in the saltwater scene. Makes for a killer Smallmouth pattern in smaller sizes. This pattern moves in the water just like a wounded baitfish, kicking back and forth in the water with each strip of the line. Easy to imitate a large amount of forage by changing color of the materials.

Material List:

Hook: Gamakatsu S11-4L2H #2 (4x Long, 2x Heavy)

Thread: Veevus Power Thread 140, White

Tail: Bucktail

Flash: Flashabou/Krystal flash

Kicker/Veil: EP Streamer Brush, White

Body: Eztaz Size Large/Grande

Eyes: Flymen's Fish-Skull Living Eyes Earth 7.0mm

Color: Prisimatic Permanent Craft Marker

How to Fly Fish Even Better Fish the Tributaries in the Fall By Joe Bruce

When the summer heat starts to be a thing of the past, the Chesapeake Bay's tidal tributaries start to heat up. I'm not talking temperatures, but the abundance of fish present as the water cools.



All summer these waters have been home to great schools of baitfish, pretty much unmolested because it was too hot for stripers to enter—not so in the fall.

This a great time for the fly rodder! Poppers in the morning and sink-tips and sinking lines during the day, be sure to arm yourself with 14 lbs. tippets with Clouser Minnows and do battle.

Sizing your Clouser to a #4 hook will not only catch you stripers, but also white and yellow perch. My color choices are all yellow and all white top and bottom.

I go to the more out of the way waters in my kayak to avoid a lot of boat traffic. My yak doesn't handle wave action, so I keep to the head waters mostly.

Here are some of my secret places: Skipton Creek off of Wye River, the Wye is good also up river, Leeds Creek for stripers and big perch, Hunting Creek off the Miles, and Trappe Creek is another gem. These are all Eastern Shore tidal waters, less populated, so less traffic and the auto traffic is dropping off to boot.

A dear friend of mine, who is fishing other waters now, once caught 193 stripers from 6" to six pounds on light fly rods, in a day, and we were never more than 34 mile from the Wye Landing.

Duberfly Trout School Offer to FSFF Members

On Saturday November 16th, our own Duber Winters and his fly fishing team will be conducting a Trout School at Double Spur Outfitters in Star Tannery Virginia. The school is taught on a private stretch of Cedar Creek that is meticulously managed and stocked by the owner Levi Pitcoock. They limit this particular school to 8 students maximum and typically keep an instructor to student ratio of 1:2. School hours are 7:30-3:00 and anglers are invited to continue fishing at the conclusion of the school to work the stream without a guide and apply new found skills on their own. In addition, while they typically promote and teach catch and release techniques, this is one of



the few private fisheries that we work with that allows for the harvesting of a few fish per angler... Trout dinner anyone??? Cost of the school is \$275.00.



Duber is making this school available to Free State Fly Fishers Members before offering it to any other groups or anglers—his hope is to fill this school with FSFF Members. As with all Duberfly Schools, this is a first come first serve event.

Club's Funds Fully Sustaining Club Operations, with Sufficient Funds Remaining

The club is going through a period of financial well-being not typical of our past decades. Fund raising efforts of members and donations by past and current members have greatly improved our financial outlook. The significant increases in club membership over the past several years have also directly contributed. That said, assuring continued appropriate use of our funds should assure continued financial stability of the club for many years to come.

The club presently has in the range of \$7,000 in our treasury. Our typical cost of operations is about \$1,000 per year. This include charges for our post office mailbox in Davidsonville, insurance, membership in the Fly Fishers International, annual web site fees, stamps, and an annual donation to the Davidsonville Family Recreation Center. These

necessary costs are easily covered by our annual membership dues which recently have amounted to nearly \$2,000 per year as we now have over 100 paying members.

This leaves a substantial balance to carry out our club's mission. We have chosen to provide funds to the River Keepers for the West and Rhode rivers, South River, Severn River, Patuxent River and Magothy River at the level of \$100 each for a total investment of \$500. We also support our monthly fly tying sessions as a club activity and provide snacks and drinks at the monthly meetings and movie nights as well as food at special sessions sponsored by the club. We typically spend in the range of \$300 per year supporting these club sponsored events and investments.

The other area of expenditures where discretionary funds are spent is seed money for special activities which either pay for themselves or make a profit for the club when completed. Examples are the Holiday Dinner and Party, monthly club meeting raffles, and special sessions like our February 2019 Icelandic Wool dyeing session.

We will most likely carry over \$6,500 to \$7,000 in our club's checking accounting into 2020. Assuming our membership remains stable, the membership fees alone should more than cover the costs of club operations described above, providing additional funds which the club can invest in important capital improvements to the clubhouse as well as club operations.

Summary of the September FSFF Leadership Team Meeting

On September 16th, all seven members of the club's Leadership Team met at the clubhouse to work through a host of topics. Here's a summary of the resultant decisions and actions. The full meeting summary is accessible via the club's web site at: http://fs-

- Agreement to confirm club sponsored events and activities dates, meeting speakers, fly tying session leaders, etc. at least 3-4 months in advance and the dates and locations for outings at least 1-2 months in advance to enable members to schedule these on their personal calendars and to give Cliff Young enough advance time for make his publicity notifications and contacts.
- Agreement for working towards scheduling hands-on and demonstration activities and events once every month to two months throughout the year, targeting Saturdays on which we have not scheduled fly tying sessions.
- Given members expressions of strong interest, agreement to schedule both more Icelandic wool dyeing sessions as well as bucktail and hackle neck dyeing sessions in 2020 and beyond.
- Agreement on the need for not only scheduling a fly tying 101 class, but we need to schedule a fly fishing 101 class.
- Agreement to advertise volunteer opportunity events and encourage our members to participate if they are interested, but not make such volunteer opportunities a club-sponsored event.
- Agreement to make a number of changes to upcoming Swap Meets, learning from experiences with our 2019 April Swap Meet.
- Agreement to increasing FSFF visibility by having members participating in selected local fishing shows via a club sponsored table.
- Agreement to work to get more club members involved in the actual operation of the club.
- Agreement to move forward with the following investments for use by the club as a whole:
 - Purchase a small tripod, web camera, and upgraded LCD projector
 - Purchase folding chairs with built in cushions that can be stacked on a cart
 - Build and install two large cork bulletin boards
 - Purchase new curtains

- Purchase new window shades
- Work with a digital graphic company to get a higher quality graphical image of our club logo
- Purchase a new club logo to replace the club logo placed outside of the front door
- Agreement to share the names and email addresses of members, after removing those members who asked that their contact information not be shared, twice a year—spring and fall—with all members.
- Agreement on a draft proposed revised set of club by-laws to share with all members for review and comments.
- Agreement that the club needs to work to address liability as it relates to club sponsored outings by securing expert counsel to recommend options for how the club can address the issue of liability for outings.
- Agreement to put forth a slate of recommended officers reflective of the 2019 officers at the October club meeting.

Where to Fish Town Creek, Maryland By Gary Grey

There aren't a lot of unutilized trout fishing streams suitable for fly fishing in Maryland, but one notable one is Town Creek in Allegany County, Maryland. This is a delayed harvest stream set up for catch and release artificial lures only from October 1 through May 31, and then converts to a put and take fishery from June 1 through September 30. In general, the river is about 75% the size of the Patapsco River at Avalon (swinging bridge area) and the tree canopy and brush is high enough to allow moderate fly casting when wading in the river. It is generously stocked twice per year, 2,700 in preseason and 1,350 in early April yielding 4,050 trout per year putting it in the higher end of stocked trout streams in Maryland. It has upper and lower delayed harvest sections.

Town Creek is around 150 miles west of Annapolis, around a 2.75-hour drive. After exiting I-70 at the Flintstone exit (which is still East of Cumberland), there is an interesting 25-minute drive through pastureland and woods to the upper parking area of the catch and release section. Be sure to bring a map as there are several turns in remote areas to get to the first parking area. By my estimation, the catch and release section of Town Creek is located in among the most remote sections of Maryland, so if you REALLY want to get away from it all, this creek is a great candidate.

The upper parking area is located near "Sugar Hollow", Oldtown, MD near an old dilapidated log cabin. If you type "Sugar Hollow, Oldtown, MD" into Google Maps, it will put you very close to the upper parking lot. It is about a 100-yard walk to the creek from the parking lot through an old, overgrown field. I generally wear waders and enter the stream at the end of the trail and fish my way upstream to the end of the public fishing area where there are some very pretty rock cliffs. The

end of the public area is CLEARLY marked by the neighbors, who, let's just say, make it VERY CLEAR that you can't fish further upstream! In the six or seven times I've fished this stream, I've never had much luck with dry flies, but nymphs and wooly buggers/streamers do well. It usually takes me around 1.5 hours to fish my way to the upstream public area boundary, so if time allows, I'll return to the entry point and fish my way downstream to the lower public area boundary of the upper section. There are more pools in this section, and it is more open allowing easier and longer fly casts.

The lower parking area is located near the intersection of Lower Town Creek Road and Maniford Road and offers more good fishing. The pools are bigger and casting is easier. Also, the lower area is more tolerant of higher flows, so if the upper section is unfishable due to high flows, be sure to check the lower section.

This year I fished Town Creek three days after a significant rainstorm, which I assumed was sufficient time for the turbidity to settle out. Although I was right about the turbidity, the flows were too high in the upper section to fish comfortably, but the lower section was excellent.

Another very interesting offering is available by fishing Town Creek by the free campground located on Ruby Rd in Warrior Mountain Wildlife Management Area, only a 15-minute drive from the upper area parking lot. It has very nice tent camping sites, a gravel parking lot for RV camping use, and a composting pit latrine. All free—what more could you want!

So, if you really want to get away from it all and fish a relatively underutilized catch and return trout stream on a tight budget, this stream offers easy fly fishing, remote beautiful location, and free camping! I'll see you there!



Featured Article The Macedonian Fly: A History Lesson and a Little Fun By Mark Bange

If you Google the "History of Fly Fishing" you inevitably will come across the story of Claudius Aelianus, the Roman outdoor writer of his day. And when was that day? About 200 A.D. He was a prolific writer of no less than 17 books and many shorter works detailing his observations of the natural world. Among his major works was a treatise entitled, "On the Nature of Animals". As Romans of that era were wont to do, Claudius Aelianus travelled far from home. He visited Macedonia on the Balkan Peninsula in Southeast Europe. Specifically, he was near the Astraeus River in Macedonia. Given his interest in nature and the outdoors Claudius Aelianus was intrigued by the Macedonians' way of catching fish. He described it like this:

"They fasten red wool round a hook, and fit on to the wool two feathers which grow under a cock's wattles, and which in color are like wax. Their rod is six feet long, and their line is the same length. Then they throw their snare, and the fish, attracted and maddened by the color, comes straight at it, thinking from the pretty sight to gain a dainty mouthful; when, however, it opens its jaws, it is caught by the hook, and enjoys a bitter repast, a captive."

The above is believed to be the first written record of fly fishing. Of course, we know that the Japanese were likely doing something similar at that time or even before. Today we call that Tenkara. But no Japanese angler wrote about it, at least not as far back as Claudius Aelianus. So, the Roman gets the nod in the debate of who first described the art of fly fishing.

You can also go online and find representations of the fly that Claudius Aelianus described. I did just that and found two forms of the Macedonian fly. One has the hackle feathers as wings and the other palmers the hackle on the body of the fly. Below are my representations of those flies. But first a word of thanks to my wife Linda for pointing the way to her stash of knitting yarn. I found the red yarn I was seeking. To that I added what I presumed to be wax colored hackle and the two flies below were born.



I tied each on size 8 dry fly hooks. Now my question was where to test them. Of course, the answer was a FSFF outing. I took the above flies to our Trap Pond outing on 18 May.

While others were tossing poppers to bass and bluegills, I spent the first hour of the day throwing the above flies. I thought bluegills would find them irresistible, given they are rather non-discriminating in their food selections. However, that was not the case.

I tried the one with wings first. I didn't know if it would float or sink. It sunk like a rock. Evidently, the yarn soaked up water pretty fast. No problem, I thought. Bluegills hit darned near anything. But if bluegills were present, they ignored my Macedonian fly for a long time. And then finally, one took the challenge. I caught the little fish below:



Given its diminutive size it was just learning the craft of eating bugs. Surely it had never before seen a Macedonian fly.

I have pet goldfish bigger than this catch! Yet, I was pleased to hook it. However, the fish did get something for its trouble. The tiny bluegill took one of the wings of the fly when I released it. One fish and my Macedonian fly was finished.


Next up was the fly with the palmered hackle. Again, it took many casts until this little crappie succumbed to temptation:



After that I gave up on Macedonian flies. Foam poppers and wooly buggers finished my day and each was vastly more productive than my experimental flies from a far-off time and place.

I can only surmise that the Macedonians were much more successful with their flies than I was. Otherwise their protein menu choices were likely from land animals and birds, not fish. But it was a fun experiment and I hope you enjoyed reading about it as much as I enjoyed trying it.


