President's Message

Just this past February, your club hosted a total of nine different meetings, events, outings and activities for members to participate in. Well, I can't promise that many activities to take advantage of every month, but I can assure you that we will provide choices to get engaged almost every week! Here's how you can join your fellow members and do something fly fishing.

Monthly Meetings: Mark Bange continues to work to provide us with informative speakers at each of our monthly meetings. Given we have a growing number of talented fly fishers within our own club, we are working towards a balance between bringing in recognized regional experts and having one of our own members present at these meetings. And our June meetings focus on a hands-on opportunity to learn new fly fishing skills.

Fly Tying Session: As we would expect from Luis Santiago, he and Frank Bowne work to provide members with three different opportunities to engage in fly tying. First, the *first Saturday of every month*, a club member leads the fly tying session, teaching members, new to fly tying or experienced, how to tie up to 3 or even 4 flies. The *third Wednesday* finds club members getting together for an open fly tying session. And finally, *every other fourth Wednesday*, club members gather at Killarney House for food, drinks, fly tying and fellowship. All this for the price of a club membership—an incredible deal!

Outings: We are a fly fishing club so we put emphasis on, duh, getting out fly fishing every month, targeting at least 30 outings every year. Gary Grey coordinates all the club's outings and Mike Mattia hosts multiple pond-of-the-month outings, exposing members to new and different waters every month, sometimes several times a month. What's involved in getting out on a club sponsored outing? Get it on your calendar, show up at the designated time and place, and go fly fishing—it's that simple.

Movie Nights: On alternating fourth Wednesday nights, Luis Santiago lines up a number of very cool fly fishing flicks, guaranteed to make you think seriously about where you just gotta go fly fishing real soon.

Holiday Party: First Wednesday of December, great meal, dessert, a lot of excellent raffle prizes, opportunity to see and meet club members' spouses, partners, significant others, and lots of fellowship among fly fishers.

Swap Meet: Every spring, the club provides the opportunity to peruse an incredible array of fly fishing rods, reels, equipment, fly tying materials, books, and much more at greatly reduced prices compared with store and Internet specials. Whether buying or selling, everyone wins here.

And, throw in ride sharing to fly fishing shows and fly fishing film festivals, dyeing tying materials, demonstrating fly tying in different forums...you get the picture! No excuses-come out and join us.

The rules are very simple:

- 1. Must be a FSFF member
- 2. Must be caught on fly with flyrod in 2019
- 3. Entries by photo (with ruler if possible, to measure catch) [see the illustrative photo in the next column]
- 4. Longest bluegill mouth to tail wins

Start submitting your photos of your big bluegills to Mark Bange at mbange54@gmail.com. A running tally of all entries will be posted on-line on the club's web site throughout the year, with updates at the monthly club meetings.

The prize will be the winning member's name on clubhouse plaque (with room for winners in years to follow) and a small trophy that member keeps.

The prize and the trophy will be awarded to the winning member at the club's annual Holiday Party in December.

Biggest Bluegill Tournament as we will be catching some BIG spawning bluegills. And when you are counting the number of bluegills, largemouth bass, yellow perch, chain pickerel and other species of fish to claim during the group lunch discussions, the "LDR" rules are in effect for this outing.

My Trap Pond FSFF fishing buddy, Glen Davis, invented the term LDR or Long Distance Release on a past FSFF Trap Pond outing: count the times when you hooked a bluegill, starting to bring them in, and they self-released themselves before getting all the way to the canoe. Adding LDRs to our counts, between us we 'landed' well over one hundred bluegills during the day. Maryland DNR recognizes LDRs as it means releasing your fish without even touching them. One of the great benefits of being a FSFF member is having completely free access to a wide array of talented fly tiers. There are two types of fly tying sessions sponsored by the club.

Featured Fly

Chernobyl Hopper By Walt Marcella



Materials

Hook: Tiemco 300, size 10

Thread: Uni-thread, 6/0 (color to match body) or kevlar **Body:** Thin foam (razor) glued together with super 77

Rib: Uni-thread, color to match the underbody **Legs:** Barred round rubber legs (spirit river)

Parachute Post: Hi-vis (green)

Step 1: Start the thread at the front and wind back to the bend. It's important to have a thread base so the foam doesn't shift from side to side.

Step 2: To apply multiple colors and actually make the cut with premade shaped blades for whatever body you're trying to make you'll need to use razor foam or



1mm. And nothing bigger or it will be impossible to have a lot of colors for the body. Measure the body according to the hook size you're using. Tie it

in where you leave ¼ inch hanging off the back. You can go longer if you like, it's really up to you. Also when tying it in make sure your wraps are on top of each other and not side by side. After firmly tying it in, you can add a drop of zap-a-gap on the underside.

Step 3: Now you're ready for the legs. Fold them around the thread and tie them in.



Step 4: Now gauge the thread wraps to make the



segmentations. You can have as many as you want, but I'm doing four total until I get up to the eye. In order to make wide spaces you'll need to lift up the foam and wind forward

until you get to the desired length you want.



Step 5: The last segmentation you want to be back just a little from the eye of the hook.

Step 6: Attach the next set of legs. Add a drop of zap-a-



gap on the underside (where the thread wraps are).

Step 7: This next step is up to you, but after you tie in



the legs you can add a piece of hivis for a post and it acts as a wing or an indicator for you to see if making long drifts.

Step 8: Whip finish the fly and glue the eye.

How to Fly Fish Even Better

Saving your fly from further destruction

We labor over trying to tie the best fly we can and then turn around and precede to throw it into a fish's mouth full of teeth... the chain pickerel. There isn't much we can do about their teeth damaging our fly, especially from repeated fish, but to try pulling it out through all those hundreds of teeth will certainly hasten its demise. We can help save more damage by this simple trick.

This trick to keep your lure or fly intact longer when encountering toothy fish, I found by shear accident. A fish engulfed my fly and I managed to get the hook out, but most of the fur was still in its mouth. The fish shook out of my hand, landed in the water next to the boat, opened its mouth and the fly just slipped out. Was this just a luck? Nope, no way! This happened several times that day with flies and flukes. Every time after I removed the hook and put the fish back in the water, it released my offering. I now do this every time the fish will not let go and it works. Give it a try and save your flies that you tried so hard to make look pretty to the fish from further destruction.

Duber Winters Profile

Editor's Note: Recently, we welcomed another new member to Free State Fly Fisher who makes their living from fly fishing. Already, Duber has presented at the April club meeting, agreed to help with casting demonstrations at the June meeting, present again at our September meeting, be a mentor, and lead an on stream trout fly fishing class. Duber hails from Southeastern Pennsylvania, where he grew up catching trout from mountain streams and smallmouth bass on the Susquehanna. His more-then-20-year career as a guide, Orvis store manager, author, and naturalist has equipped him with a wealth of knowledge about all aspects of both fresh and saltwater fly fishing.



Capt. Duber is an expert angler and fly-tier, a licensed captain, and a certified fly casting instructor. He spent more than a decade as a professional guide in Florida, where he led fly fishers of all experience levels to success landing

saltwater fish such as tarpon, sailfish, snook, and permit-only species. In the Florida Keys, he joined the Orvis Company as a store manager and guide.

He later worked for Orvis as a sales manager in Richmond, Va. and then as store manager in Woodbridge, Va., and Arlington, Va.—all the while conducting multiple guided trips each year across the US and overseas. Where to Fish

Muddy Creek, York County, Pennsylvania

Located in southeastern York County, Muddy Creek has 10 miles of designated trout fishing, with the pools and riffles getting longer and bigger as one goes downstream. Both the East and West branches are two plus miles long, merging at Muddy Creek Forks to form the main stream which is over 5 miles long.

All three sections are stocked with rainbow and brown trout, with the best fishing area is the 3-mile fly fishing only area from Bridgeton to Bruce on the main stream.

Muddy Creek is a 2-hour drive from the Baltimore Beltway. Take I-83 north to the first exit in Pennsylvania, the Shewsbury exit. At the end of the exit ramp turn right; you will be on PA Route 851 going east. Continue on Route 851 to Stewartstown. Route 851 will turn left in Stewartstown, continue on Route 851 to the village New Park.



In New Park, continue east for a couple of miles, and take the left fork at the Y. Go about 4 miles to the village of Gatcheville, after which you will come to a T-intersection. Turn right at the T on Bridgeton Road.

Continue on Bridgeton Road for 3 or 4 miles. At the bottom the hill, go across the bridge over Muddy Creek. Go about 30 yards, and take the road on the left to access the fly fishing only area. Muddy Creek will be on you left. You can park along the road, but don't block any of the driveways along the road. There is a parking area that can 3 or 4 cars on the right.

The fly fishing only area starts a couple of hundred yards upstream from the bridge at Bridgeton, and continues upstream for 3 miles.

The Fly Fishing Only Area is open to fishing all year long, except opening day of trout fishing one cannot fish before 8 a.m. It is catch and release fishing until June 15th with a limit of 3 fish per person per day.

Fish rise along the big pool upstream of Bridgeton sporadically all day long. In the evening, the hatch becomes more intense. Mayflies hatch in May and early June. The sulphur hatch is the most intense hatch. Nymphs and streamers work best in early morning, and until mid-day.


Stream flow varies depending the amount of recent rainfall. There is a stream gauge on Muddy Creek at Castle Finn. Check this gauge, and compare the present flow to the average stream.

There is a reason why it's called Muddy Creek. The watershed is mainly farm country so when it rains in the spring, the creek gets muddy. But it will usually clear-up in a day or two. Some of my best fishing occurred mid-day, or the evening after, the day it rained.

Book Review - The Feather Thief

The Feather Thief by Kirk Johnson takes readers on several journeys. It describes the work of Englishman Alfred Wallace, a contemporary of Charles Darwin. Wallace spent years traveling to remote islands collecting exotic birds which later became museum exhibits throughout the world. Wallace also independently came up with the theory of evolution and he shared it in letters with Darwin prior to Darwin's 1859 publication of his famous work, On the Origin of Species. The two naturalists reached the same conclusions independently. In fact, Wallace's correspondence with Darwin hastened Darwin's release of his famous evolution theory. Surprisingly, the two men remained cordial and Wallace never showed a hint of professional jealously toward Darwin.



A second story coursing through the book is the role of feathers in human fashion. Stylish Victorian era women adorned their hats with the feathers of egrets, ospreys and countless other bird species, especially those, like the Bird of Paradise, found on remote tropical islands. International feather markets developed where feathers were traded

like gold and valued almost as much. The feather fashion trend decimated populations of birds with the most beautiful plumages. Conservationists and governments stepped in to limit this trade. Laws initiated in the early 20th century have since been strengthened and widened internationally to protect wild bird populations.

Enter a third storyline in the book -- fly tying. In England while the feathers were taking over the fashion industry, tiers of salmon flies used those same feathers to create ornate flies. Salmon flies are not tied to imitate anything natural that salmon eat. They are tied in bright colors to elicit a strike response by spawning fish. In time, salmon flies became an artform as much as a way to catch fish. In fact, many salmon fly tiers then and now shun fishing.

As international laws restricted access to the wild feathers used in salmon flies, tiers found workarounds. They would dye and paint feathers from domestic fowl. However, their demand for the "real thing" has never abated. An underground market developed for wild feathers. Sellers of these feathers claim they come from old bird mounts and women's hats found in antiques shops. Some come from the inventories of deceased tiers. And unfortunately, some still come from poaching. Regardless of source, their scarcity requires salmon fly aficionados to pay exorbitant prices for the feathers they use in their creations. A single fly may contain rare feathers costing thousands of dollars. The internet has actually enabled and emboldened this shady commerce in exotic feathers.

Now begins the final storyline of the book. In 2009 a 20-year-old American student named Edwin Rist was studying the flute at the Royal Academy of Music in London. Rist also happened to be a salmon fly tier. Like many who shared his passion,

he was not a fisherman. He was solely a tier and a very good one. He was also obsessed with using traditional feathers in his flies. While pursuing his studies in London, Rist learned that he was living only a short train ride away from the Natural History Museum in Tring, Hertfordshire. That particular museum houses one of the largest collections preserved birds on earth, including those originally found and catalogued in the 19th century by Alfred Wallace.

The proximity to those feathers was too much for young Mr. Rist to bear. After much planning, he visited the museum off hours to expand his personal collection of tying materials. He was successful in that endeavor and sold the results of his thievery on-line to willing salmon fly tiers around the world, while keeping many of them for himself. It took more than a year for detectives to catch him. But the real surprise in the book was Mr. Rist's legal defense and the resulting decision of the English court. I will leave that to you to find out by reading the book.

I believe FSFF members will find <u>The Feather Thief</u> an interesting read. The author is a fly angler himself and an excellent writer. He has given us a book that is part history, part mystery and a sad commentary of how some on the fringes of our hobby can rationalize crimes against nature for personal gratification.

The book was published by Viking Press in 2018. It is currently available at the Anne Arundel County Public Library.

Editor's Note: I asked Mark for his permission to include this book review given the close connection to our fly tying materials. Thought this review might interest our members to read this book. The extent to which some of us fly tiers will go for some good feather materials!
