Kayak Fishing Course March 9 and May 11

On Saturday, March 9 and then again on May 11, 2019, Anne Arundel Community College (AACC) will offer a one-day, 4-hour adult education noncredit course on Kayak Fishing at its Arnold Campus. The course will be taught by FSFF members Mark Bange and John Veil.

They have developed a comprehensive curriculum on kayak fishing that covers:

- Factors to consider in selecting a paddle or pedal-driven fishing kayak
- Essential gear PFDs, paddles, rods, reels, lines, leaders and lures
- Ancillary equipment carts, rod holders, fish finders, VHF radios, etc.
- Safety on the water
- Effective kayak angling techniques and strategies:
 - Reading the water
 - Using structure to your advantage
 - Lure selection and use
 - Trolling
 - Casting
 - Fly fishing
- Tidal and freshwater species you can catch from your kayak
- How to target those species.
- Specific locations to launch your kayak for the best fishing in Anne Arundel county and beyond.

They stress easy-to-master, highly effective techniques. Further, they'll have a sampling of their own tackle and two kayaks present in the classroom to demonstrate rigging possibilities.

So, look forward to a conversational session where Mark and John share their kayak angling knowledge and answer your questions about the hobby. You'll also get a copy of their slides and a certificate of completion from AACC.

Featured Fly

Black Nose Dace Bucktail Streamer By Luis Santiago

In 1947, Art Flick, an accomplished and innovative fly tier from the Catskill Region of NY, published his best-known book "Art Flick's Streamside Guide." Here is where the Black Nose Dace Bucktail Streamer was first introduced. Art invented the Black Nose Dace Bucktail Streamer to imitate the dace and chubs that lived in the stream. Today this is one of the most popular flies to catch trout and bass with.

The Black Nose Dace is a simple fly to learn how to tie; one of the tricks is to keep it sparse. This fly will teach you how to work with bucktail and tinsel. This fly is tied on a streamer hook, which is 5X to 7X long in sizes 4 through 12.



Materials

Hook: 5X to 7X long shank Hook sizes 4 through 12
Thread: Black 6/0 or 70 Denier
Tail: Red Yarn
Body: Silver Mylar Tinsel
Wing: Brown over Black over White Bucktail

Where to Fish

Maryland's Catoctin Creek

For those of you who like to fish trout, there is a great location to try that is only about an hour away from Baltimore. The stream is Catoctin Creek. The stocked portion is located within the Catoctin Creek Nature Center located between Middletown and Jefferson, Maryland.

The Catoctin Creek Nature Center has a large parking. There are also bathroom facilities at the center, which is good after the morning coffee and hour drive. The park opens at sunrise and closes at 6:00 PM.

The access to the stream is excellent. There are paved and nice trails to get to the stream. It is about a ¼ to ½ mile walk to get to the stream depending on where you start. The beginning of the stocked area can be accessed by taking the path that goes down behind the old barn foundation. The stocked portion runs for about ¾ of a mile. The stream flows relatively straight for about a third then turns right and goes through some rocks and riffles and then opens up into a very long flat pool. Wherever you see a trail to the creek, that is where the fish were stocked. It's pretty easy to figure it out.

The stream muddies quickly with a hard rain and takes a day or two to clear. You can get a feel for stream condition by accessing state streamflow data and clicking on Catoctin Creek tab under the Potomac River section.

You will be able to catch three species of trout: Rainbows, Browns, and Goldens. This is a relatively small stream, so rods designed to throw 2-4 weight lines are the best equipment. During the spring when the water is clear, go with light 6X to 7X tippet for the best results.

Rising fish can be caught with CDC BWO, size 18-20, but remember these are stocked fish so don't get too complicated. Presentation accounts for more.

If you are fishing a slow long pool, move very slowly. The fish will know that you are there if you make enough noise and move. If you find rising fish, stand still and they will come back to you.

There are opportunities to fish from the shore but if you want to go into some of the long pools the water will come up to your waist in areas. By mid-April, until cooler weather, waders are optional.

From mid-April or so to the end of May this stream is excellent also for bluegills, chubs, and smallmouth bass (up to 18"). At the end of May you'll start to be eaten alive by the deer flies and horseflies. Still good fishing but not much fun fishing with long sleeve shirts, pants, and head covering in 80-degree weather.

How to Fly Fish Even Better

Consider the Color Yellow

Chain Pickerel

It's the season of the chain pickerel. This is a fish with antifreeze for blood. I have even caught them under the edge of ice. They are the perfect fish for curing "cabin fever."

Grab a five to eight weight rod with floating line and a streamer style pattern and you are setup for pickerel. They have teeth, so a bite tippet is in order. I have a leader for pickerel that consists of a three-foot piece of 50 lb test double surgeons to four feet of forty pound. The fifty is looped to the line and I use a two-wrap loop knot for the fly. After a bunch of pickerel, I will cut the loop and retie the fly. I have even been cut off on fortypound, but not often. I like mono better than wire because wire can kink.

My pickerel arsenal is short: I use articulated Bullethead Darters is their preferred color yellow, followed by a white tail and yellow Bullethead and all white.

Pickerel like a roof over their head so if pads or grass are still around fish these areas, not right in the pads but around them. As winter keeps moving on, they will abandon these flats and take up residence on the shore with trees and structure. At this point it is like fishing for bluegill just fishing down the shore going from point "A" to point "B," fishing any available structure.

My general retrieve is a six to twelve-inch strip with a second or two pauses in between.

I also like to carry a spinning rod rigged with a swimming fluke (paddle tail) as my locator. I can cover more water with the spin. If I get a blowup, miss, or slash at the bait I drop the rod and grab the fly rod and cast it back over the area of the blowup. I will catch this fish 90% of the time. The pickerel can "light-up" in winter, especially to the supple movement of the bullethead. It's like feeding them candy. So, if the temps get over forty degrees with winds less the ten, I'm going pickerel fishing to fight off "cabin fever."

Fishing and Conservation Issues

Healthy Striper Reproduction in Maryland The Maryland Department of Natural Resources recently published the findings from its annual young-of-theyear striped bass survey for 2018. Fisheries scientists documented an index of 14.8, slightly above the annual average of 11.8. While this isn't a banner score (at times the index has peaked at over 50 and at a low point in 2012, was less than 1.0), it represents a solid spring for reproduction and a slight improvement over last season's young-of-the-year index of 13.2. Twentytwo sites were surveyed via seine net to establish the index, resulting in the collection of almost 2000 newly hatched stripers. Maryland Department of Natural Resources also reported that white perch and American shad had above-average spawning seasons, as well. [FishTalk]

Good DE/MD/VA Coastal Bays Report Card The latest Delaware/Maryland/Virginia Coastal Bays Report is out with good news. The grade: B-, which is its highest yet. The Report Card is a collaborative effort between the Maryland Coastal Bays Program, the University of Maryland Center for Environmental Science, the Maryland Department of Natural Resources, the Virginia Institute of Marine Science, and the National Park Service. While the Chesapeake Bay rightfully garners most of the headlines in our region, it's important not to neglect the many coastal bays lining the Delmarva coast, which we visit to fish for everything from flounder to bluefish—and in some rare cases in Virginia coastal bay, also provides one of the northernmost tarpon fisheries in existence.

Record Freshwater Flow It's official, the Chesapeake Bay experienced a record-breaking amount of freshwater flow this summer. The U.S. Geological Survey said that this past August freshwater ran into the Chesapeake Bay at an average rate of 133,000 cubic feet per second, eclipsing the previous record of 96,000 cubic feet per second set in 1955 thanks to a pair of hurricanes. So yes, our epic rainfall and the resulting super-saturation of the ground left us with more river flow than not one but two hurricanes. According to watermen, the initial impact could be immediately seen on the soft clam populations, and during the summer and early fall harvests saw huge numbers of dead and dying clams. Though there is sure to be further news of repercussions, the abnormal freshwater flow's impact on other Bay life has yet to be determined. [FishTalk]

Oyster Recovery Partnership Plants 11 Million Baby

Oysters In July, the Oyster Recovery Partnership (ORP) teamed up with the Severn River Association, and planted 11 million baby oysters in the Severn River as part of their "Operation Build a Reef" initiative. ORP's planting boats, Robert Lee, move between the Severn River Bridge and the Naval Academy Bridge, dumping oysters into the water. [What's Up Annapolis]

More Funding for Chesapeake Bay Restoration

Maryland recently announced that 18 recipients would be receiving funding via the Chesapeake Bay and Atlantic Coast Bays Trust Fund, to improve water quality. "These 18 implementation-ready-projects, totaling \$22 million dollars of investments, will have a long-lasting, positive impact on the Bay and our environment and build on our historic investment in Bay restoration efforts," said Maryland Governor Larry Hogan in a press release. Projects that made the list range from headwater stream restoration, to deepening stormwater management ponds to fencing cattle out of floodplain areas. Since its creation in 2007, the Trust Fund has supported over 2200 such projects. [FishTalk]

Federal Taxes Benefiting Hunters and Fishermen

Federal excise taxes are paid by the manufacturers of firearms, ammunition, archery equipment and fishing gear. Last year, these taxes totaled more than \$1 billion. The resultant money is divided among state fish and wildlife management agencies. The Maryland Department of Natural Resources received \$11 million last year. The Department uses these revenues for programs that benefit wildlife, fish and their habitats, including species not hunted or fished, such as butterflies and birds. The money has helped reverse population declines of species including elk, and in Maryland, has helped pay for work to map populations of amphibians and reptiles and to grow species such of the black-banded sunfish.
