From Rt 2: Take Rt 214 west 3.7 miles to 3727 Queen Anne Bridge Rd. Turn left and go 1.2 miles to the DFRC.



As of 5 May 2012, the FSFF account has a balance of \$4297.20. Recent expenses include the donation of \$200 to the Davidsonville Family Recreation Center, paint for clubhouse maintenance of \$29.07. The club has sold all of its hats and more will be ordered (with a longer bill if possible as requested by George Vincent) and available probably in November. Monthly raffles are generating a steady income and memberships are up quite a bit. State tax forms were filed in March.

2012 FREE STATE FLY FISHERS OUTINGS: PAST, PRESENT AND PLANNED

Starting out in January of this year as the outings coordinator, I committed to work towards at least one Free State Fly Fishers Club outing each month...well, each month during which our flylines would not freeze mid-cast, that is. So far, we are have been very successful, with a number of club members stepping up and coordinating an outing, and with some months with 2 even 3 outings scheduled. Information on all outings is presented at club meetings prior each outing and the emailed to all club members a week in advance of the respective outing.

February: George Vincent led a trip to Allens Pond in Bowie for trout, getting an early start on the 2012 fishing season.

March: Our planned outing to Muddy Creek in lower Pennsylvania lived up the names of the destination—huge rain showers poured water from the sky and did not let up even when several hardy FSFF members waited in a car at the Park 'n Ride meeting location for over an hour. [Tom Gooding and I made a trip up to Muddy Creek the next weekend and both caught a number of nice size trout in the fly fishing only section on nymphs—

definitely a trip going on the 2013 outings calendar!]

April: George Vincent led an outing to the Gunpowder River mid-week for trout fishing. (Oh, to be retired and miss the weekend fishing crowds!) Tom Gooding brought a bunch of FSFF members to Deer Creek in search of spawning shad—a lot of searching with very limited number of shad caught. The crazy spring weather and temperatures kept the shad hanging out in the Susquehanna River until real late in the spawn. We are going back again, because anyone who have experienced a good evening of shad fishing on Deer Creek knows its truly an amazing experience.

May: We established a record for the club with three outings. John Donnelly led a larger contingent of Free State Fly Fishers back to Trap Pond for a full day and into the fishing, evening including OUSTANDING mid-day feast. [You have got to be John's grilled chicken strips receipe...its almost better than fishing!] Rich Batiuk took club members to Unicorn Pond in search of spawning bluegills found spawning beds, but limited mother bluegills (but a number of pickerel). Finally, Larry Myer hosted club members on his local waters—the Patapsco River for smallmouth bass and green ear sunfish.

June: We have two trips lined up for this month. Ken Moser and John Scarborough are heading back out to Western Maryland for June 7-10, with plans to hit a number of streams and rivers for trout. Members are welcome to join up with them for one day or all four. And on June 12, Ray Cline is leading an outing to the Monocacy River for smallmouth bass fishing in the afternoon and evening.

July: Rich Batiuk will be leading an outing to the Potomac River at Brunswick on Saturday, July 21, continuing a traditional annual summer wet wading outing during the infamous white fly hatch.

August/September: Have not scheduled club outings for these months—need some club members to step up and agree to coordinate an outing to their favorite fishing spot.

At our September Free State Fly Fishers club meeting, we will schedule the fall 2012 outings. And at our January club meeting, we will schedule the full year of 2013 outings. Remember, all that is involved with coordinating an outing is simply: identify a fishing location, write up a simple one page outing description, and meet club members at the defined meeting location. Conservation News

Conservation is one of the founding principles of the Federation of Fly Fishers. Contributing over 40 years of conservation work, the Federation of Fly Fishers is proud to continue protecting our fisheries and angling opportunities for the future.

The grassroots activities done by the work of our many Clubs and Councils are the heart of our conservation efforts. River trash pick-up, stream habitat restoration or letter drives to local government officials are all examples of conservation work.

FFF Announcements

The Federation of Fly Fishers supports the rights of anglers to recreationally pursue fishing in the waters of the United States.

The U.S. Clean Water Act of 1972 establishes a policy of maintaining fishable waters. The Federation of Fly Fishers and its members wholeheartedly accept this provision and adopt the following pro-active policy in support of the Clean Water Act.

The Federation of Fly Fishers and its members shall...

- Support the Federal and State environmental agencies in their implementation and enforcement of water quality standards applicable to fish.
- Coordinate our volunteer activities and financial resources with other conservation and environmental organizations seeking to protect water quality;
- Participate in clean-up and restoration projects to build or improve fisheries;
- Encourage our members to monitor our favorite fishing streams and lakes by utilizing the
 appropriate tests from the FFF or other sources to measure temperatures, dissolved
 oxygen, turbidity, and other state and federal water quality measures to assure
 compliance with established standards;
- Report pollution events (oil and chemical spills, suspected polluting outfalls, violations of water quality standards, etc.) to emergency and enforcement officials.
- In appreciation of the quality resources gifted us by our forbearers; we shall leave these resources no less diminished to our children.
