Saturday, January 8 Free State Fly Fishers' Fly Tying Session 10 AM-12 PM Harry Murray's River Smallmouth Bass/Sunfish Patterns¹

This Fly Tying Session will focus on tying several of Harry Murray's most effective fly patterns when fly fishing on rivers with smallmouth bass and sunfish species. Be sure to bring the following fly tying tools with you if you have them: vise, bobbin, bobbin threader, bodkin, 6" ruler, scissors hackler pliers, sharpening stone (optional), and pliers (optional). The club has vises and many of these fly tying tools available at the clubhouse for use by members so no worries if you don't have access to everything listed above. I will be bringing all the hooks and fly tying materials for tying all four patterns, but please bring your own thread in black, orange, and tan colors.

Murray's Hellgrammite

Hook: Mustad 9672 Sizes 4, 6, 8 and 10

Thread: Black 3/0

Body: Black large chenille

Extended Rear Body: Ostrich herl to match the body color **Hackle:** Saddle or cape hackle to match the body color

Pincers: Black rubber

Eyes/Weight: Barbell eyes, small 6/32



This easy to tie fly is a must for your smallmouth bass fly box. Worked along the bottom of your favorite smallmouth bass stream or river, it's one of the best ways to pull out good sized-smallmouth bass. The

pattern can be tied in black, olive and brown colors. Recommend having flies in each of these colors in your fly box as both the light conditions you are fishing in as well as depending on where you are fishing, using these different colors will make a difference in your cast to catch ratios.

Murray's Skunk Road Kill Nymph

Hook: Mustad 9672 Sizes 4, 6, and 8

Thread: Black 3/0

Body: Black large chenille **Tail**: Black rabbit fur strip

Hackle: Saddle hackle to match the body color

Legs: Black round rubber

Eyes/Weight: Barbell eyes, medium



This unique pattern has an amazing underwater action with all the rubber legs pointing out in all different directions supplemented by hackle. It stimulates a nymph tumbling down a river without attempting to match a specific species. And yes, part of the required fly tying skills for this fly are tying a fly that looks like a hot mess! The messier this fly looks, the more natural it will look! That's great news for us fly tiers.

Murray's Blond Perch Bucktail

Hook: Mustad 9672 Sizes 4, 6, and 8

Thread: Orange 3/0

Body: Yellow large crystal chenille

Wing: Orange and yellow bucktail and red krystal flash **Tail**: Orange and yellow bucktail and red krystal flash

Weight: Lead free medium wire



This is a very effective pattern on a bright sunny day when cast across the current and slightly upstream and allowed to swing through the current and then retrieved with short strips. This fly represents a small to medium sized green sunfish.

Murray's Crayfish

Hook: Mustad 9672 Size 6

Thread: Tan 3/0

Feelers/Pinchers: Ringneck Pheasant Tail Fibers

Body: Medium ginger chenille **Legs**: Brown saddle hackle


Shell Back and Tail: Trimmed olive rabbit skin

Weight: Lead free medium 0.020

Ribbing: Five to six wraps of 3.0 tan thread to the rear half of the shell back



A relatively straightforward to tie, yet very realistic crayfish pattern that does not rely on very unique materials. If you fly fish for smallmouth, you fly box must include crayfish (or crawdad if you are from the deep south) patterns in colors reflective of the local population.
